Volume 14, Issue 32 September 7, 2024 Printable Remember: versions found online News from Around PA A resolution introduced by the Democratic Socialists of America to "protect" trans adults and youth and provide them with a "welcoming haven" has unanimously passed the State College Borough Council. The purpose of Resolution No. 1394 is "to protect and grant refuge to transgender and non-binary youth and their parents fleeing states with anti-transgender laws". The borough is now a safe haven for transgenders!

Former University of Pennsylvania president Liz Magill, who remains a law professor at UPenn's Law School, will soon be a fellow at Harvard Law School's Center on the Legal Profession, as well as a visiting professor at the London School of Economics.

UPenn started out the new school year with the Women's Center and the Penn Association for Gender Equity (PAGE) hosting a freshman preorientation program to create "a safe space for first students of year

marginalized genders and their allies to share their experiences and continue to grow."

The Philadelphia Marathon award winners will now across three gender categories - men's, women's and nonbinary races. The Marathon has made other changes such as "creating gender neutral chest-feeding stations, offering all-gender rooms changing and auditing restrooms, and updating language and processes, and implementing DEI and inclusion-specific training for security professionals."

National From Scene South Carolina, In the International House of Pancakes (IHOP) granted a religious accommodation to a Christian who was a hired as a cook, exempting him from working Sundays. on However, a new manager refused to recognize that and fired him for refusing to work Sundays. The worker won his lawsuit and will receive \$40,000 in compensation and franchise owner Suncakes will provide annual training to managers on religious liberty.

In California a federal court dismissed a suit against Grace Calvary Chapel pastor Josh Blevins. The plaintiff wanted the pastor to be held liable for writing a letter to the St. Joseph City Council, posting it on his personal Facebook page and preaching a sermon at his church, all urging against an LGBTQ pastor's reappointment to a local library board. The court found that the pastor's actions were protected under the First Amendment.

Facebook shut down **Hillsdale College's** online courses pages the same day the school launched a course critical of Communism and Marxism.

The **lowa Supreme Court** upheld the state's strict abortion law and reiterated that there is no constitutional <u>right to abortion in the state</u>.
